

Summary of FY2022 Federal Budget for Human and Social Service Organizations

In early March 2022, Congress [voted to pass](#) the fiscal year 2022 omnibus budget bill after months of delays. This bipartisan bill represents significant investments in many priority areas for the Social Current network including advancing trauma-informed care, investing in early childhood education, developing whole-child approaches through partnerships with K-12 education, increasing funds for rental assistance and public housing to address the housing crisis, bolstering maternal health equity through new interventions, supporting the behavioral health workforce crisis with new investments, and more. The package also including supplemental funding of over \$13 billion for [Ukraine relief](#).

In addition, this legislative package included the passage of [the Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act](#). This legislation takes steps to strengthen services, invest in prevention efforts, and expand access to survivors in rural areas and those requiring cultural-specific services.

Department of Agriculture

- **Rural Broadband - \$550 million** to provide broadband service and foster economic development in rural areas.
- **Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) - \$6 billion**, including a \$834 million increase to the amounts of fruits and vegetables.
- **Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) - \$140.4 billion**, enough to serve 42 million people.
- **Child nutrition programs - \$26.9 billion** (increase of \$1.77 billion above FY21) for school lunches and snacks. In addition, \$45 million for summer EBT programs and \$6 million for school breakfast expansion grants.
- **Women Infants and Children (WIC) - \$6 billion** in discretionary funding, a \$834 million increase to expand fruits and vegetables in the program.

Department of Education

- **Title I Grants to Local Educational Agencies - \$17.5 billion** (increase of \$1 billion above FY21).
- **Special Education Grants to States (IDEA Part B) - \$13.3 billion** (increase of \$448 million above FY21).
- **Student Support and Academic Enrichment State Grants - \$1.3 billion** (increase of \$60 million above FY21 level).
- **Nita Lowey 21st-Century Community Learning Centers - \$1.3 billion** (increase in \$60 million above FY21).
- **Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) Initiative to support whole-child approaches to education:**
 - **\$82 million (increase of \$15 million above FY21 for the Education Innovation and Research Program)** - for evidence-based, field-initiated innovations that address student social and emotional needs.
 - **Supporting Effective Educator Development (SEED) - \$85 million** for teacher professional development and pathways into teaching that provide a strong foundation in implementing SEL and whole-child strategies.

- **School Safety National Activities - \$111 million** (increase of \$95 million above FY21) to help local education agencies directly increase the number of mental health and child development experts in schools.
- **Full-Service Community Schools Program - \$75 million** (\$45 million increase over FY21) for comprehensive services to expand evidence-based models that meet needs of children, families, and communities.
- **Career and Technical Education State Grants - \$1.38 billion** (increase of \$45 million).
- **Adult Education State Grants - \$690 million** (increase of \$16 million above FY21).
- **TRIO Program - \$1.14 billion** (increase of \$40 million above FY21).
- **Child Care Access Means Parents in School - \$65 million** (increase of \$10 million above FY21).
- **Pell Grants - \$6,895** for maximum Pell awards, an increase of \$400 above FY21. This is the largest increase in the maximum award in more than a decade.
- **Corporation for National and Community Services (CNCS)**
 - **AmeriCorps State and National Grants - \$467 million** (increase of \$12 million above FY21).
 - **SeniorCorps - \$231 million** (increase of \$6 million).

Department of Health and Human Services

- **Public Health Workforce Initiatives - \$61 million** (\$5 million increase over FY21).
- **Safe Motherhood and Infant Health - \$83 million** (\$20 million increase over FY21).
- **Opioid Overdose Prevention and Surveillance - \$491 million** (\$15 million increase over FY21).
- **Mental Health Block Grant - \$2 billion** for investments across the behavioral health continuum to support prevention, screening, treatment, and other services, and \$315 million for Certified Community Behavioral Health, which is a \$288 million increase above FY21.
- **Project AWARE - \$120 million** (\$13 million increase).
- **National Child Traumatic Stress Initiative at SAMHSA - \$81.8 million** (increase of \$10 million above FY21).
- **Community Youth Violence Prevention - \$15.1 million.**
- **Infant and Early Childhood Mental Health - \$10 million** (\$2 million increase).
- **Suicide Lifeline - \$101.6 million** (\$77.6 million increase).
- **Behavioral Health Crisis and 988 Coordinating Office - \$5 million** to create a new office.
- **Garrett Lee Smith Youth Suicide Prevention Grants - \$38.8 million.**
- **New Mental Health Crisis Response Partnership Pilot - \$10 million** to help communities create mobile behavioral health crisis response teams (\$2.3 million increase).
- **Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Block Grant - \$1.908 billion** (\$50 million increase).
- **State Opioid Response Grants - \$1.525 billion** (\$25 million increase).
- **Substance Use Treatment for Pregnant and Postpartum Women - \$34.9 million** (increase of \$2 million).
- **Building Communities of Recovery - \$13 million** (\$3 million increase).
- **Medication Assistance Treatment - \$101 million** (\$10 million increase).
- **Substance Abuse Prevention - \$218.2 million** includes Strategic Prevention Framework and Sober Truth on Preventing Underage Drinking (STOP Act) (\$2 million increase).
- **School-Based Health Centers - \$30 million** (\$25 million increase).
- **Substance Use Disorder Treatment and Recovery Workforce Loan Repayment Program - \$24 million** to assist with workforce shortages in the behavioral health sector (\$8 million increase).
- **Interagency Task Force on Trauma-Informed Care - \$1 million** (new).

- **Adverse Childhood Experiences Research at CDC - \$7 million** with focus on research.
- **Maternal and Child Health Block Grant - \$748 million** (\$35 million increase).
- **State Maternal Health Innovation Grants - \$29 million** (\$6 million increase).
- **Maternal Mental Health Hotline - \$4 million** (\$1 million increase).
- **Healthy Start - \$132 million** (\$4 million increase).
- **Screening and Treatment for Maternal Depression and Related Disorders - \$6.5 million** (\$1.5 million increase).

Department of Health and Human Services

Administration for Children and Families

- **Child Care and Development Block Grant - \$6.2 billion** (\$254 million increase).
- **Head Start - \$11 billion** (\$289 million increase).
 - **\$52 million** for trauma-informed care in both Head Start and Early Head Start.
- **Preschool Development Grants - \$290 million** (\$15 million increase).
- **Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) - \$3.8 billion** (\$50 million increase).
- **Community Services Block Grant Program - \$755 million** (\$10 million increase).
- **Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act (CAPTA) - \$161 million** (\$10 million increase).
- **Family Violence and Prevention Services Act (FVPSA) - \$200 million** (\$17.5 million increase).
- **Domestic Violence Hotline - \$15.5 million** (\$2.5 million increase).
- **National Child Abuse Hotline - \$2 million** (no increase).
- **Senior Nutrition Programs - \$967 million** (\$15 million increase).
- **Home and Community-Based Supportive Services - \$399 million** (\$6 million increase).

Department of Housing and Urban Development

- **Tenant-based Rental Assistance - \$27.4 billion** to help 2.3 million low-income households, including an increase of \$200 million to expand Housing Choice Vouchers to 25,000 individuals and families.
- **Public Housing - \$8.45 billion** (increase of \$645.5 million above FY21) for constructing and repairing affordable housing.
- **Community Development Block Grants - \$3.3 billion** (\$150 million less than FY21) to build stronger and more resilient communities.
- **Office of Lead Hazard Control and Healthy Homes - \$415 million** (an increase of \$55 million) to continue radon testing and mitigation demonstration program for public housing and to conduct inspections for lead in housing choice voucher units.

Department of Justice

- **Violence Against Women Act - \$575 million.** Reauthorized with new programs, such as LGBT-specific victim services grants, and a new requirement of DOJ to notify local law enforcement if a gun background check flags an individual convicted of domestic violence or stalking.
- **Community Violence Intervention and Prevention - \$50 million** for new programs to help communities increase public safety through means other than police.
- **Juvenile Justice Programs - \$360 million**, including \$102 million for youth mentoring grants, and \$70 million for training and technical assistance to nonprofits.
- **Children Exposed to Violence Initiative - \$8 million**, program out of the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention.
- **Child Abuse Training Program for Judicial Personnel and Practitioners - \$4 million.**
- **Youth Mentoring Grants OJJDP - \$102 million.**

Department of Labor

- **Reintegration of Ex-Offenders - \$102.1 million** (\$2 million increase above previous year).
- **Registered Apprenticeships - \$235 million** (\$50 million increase above previous year).
- **Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act State Grants - \$2.9 billion** (\$34 million increase above previous year).
